VA Compensates More Veterans Exposed to Radiation

WASHINGTON - Secretary of Veterans Affairs (VA) Anthony J. Principi announced today the addition of five new cancers to the list of diseases presumed to be connected to the exposure of veterans to radiation during their military service. Veterans diagnosed with cancer of the bone, brain, colon, lung or ovary will have an easier time establishing entitlement to compensation for their illnesses beginning March 26, 2002.

"These veterans accepted the risks of duty and have borne the burden of their illnesses in service to our nation. They should not have to bear an additional and unequal burden to prove they deserve the benefits they've so rightfully earned. The new rules will not cure their cancers, but they will ease the burden of proof required to receive appropriate compensation for their disabilities," Principi said. The new rules apply to those veterans who participated in "radiation-risk activities" while on active duty, during active duty for training or inactive duty training as a member of a reserve component. The definition of radiation-risk activities has also been expanded to include service at Amchitka Island, Alaska, prior to January 1, 1974, if a veteran was exposed while performing duties related to certain underground nuclear tests. The new definition also includes service at gaseous diffusion plants located in Paducah, Ky., Portsmouth, Ohio and an area known as K25 at Oak Ridge, Tenn. The previous definition was limited to service members who took part in the occupation of Hiroshima or Nagasaki or onsite at atmospheric nuclear weapons tests, or American POWs interred in Japan during World War II. People in these groups are frequently called "atomic veterans."

In 1988, Congress established a presumption of service connection for 13 cancers in veterans exposed to "ionizing radiation," with later changes bringing the number to 16.

participated in a radiation-risk activity: leukemia (other than chronic lymphocytic leukemia), cancer of the thyroid, breast, pharynx, esophagus, stomach, small intestine, pancreas, gall bladder, bile ducts, salivary gland, or urinary tract, multiple myeloma, lymphomas (except Hodgkin's disease), primary cancer of the liver (except if cirrhosis or hepatitis B is indicated) or bronchiolo-alveolar carcinoma. VA's changes ensure equity between veterans and federal civilians who may be entitled to compensation for these cancers caused by radiation under comparable federal laws such as the Radiation Exposure Compensation Act (RECA) of 1990, as amended in 2000. Veterans or their survivors can file claims for compensation by contacting a VA regional office at

From Dick: My understanding that the foregoing is issued as a Regulation, and as such, retroactive payments for awarded Claims under this Regulation will not prevail. I have an inquiry in to VA in Washington on this subject and awaiting a reply probably in week of Jan. 28 plus.

New Rules for Diseases Specific to Radiation-Exposed Veterans Questions & Answers

- Q. What prompted VA to change these regulations?
- A. VA made the changes to ensure the rules governing federal benefit programs were applied consistently and fairly and so veterans exposed to radiation during military service would have the same burden of proof for these five cancers as civilians covered under the Radiation Exposure Compensation Act (RECA), as amended.
- Q. What do these new rules mean for veterans?
- A. It means veterans who participated in a radiation-risk activity, and is later diagnosed with one of the cancers on the list are presumed to have contracted their illness from that service-connected exposure and are eligible for disability compensation.
- Q. How many diseases are on VA's list?
- A. The addition of the five new cancers, bone, brain, colon, lung and ovarian, bring the total of presumptive diseases to 21.
- Q. Who is covered by RECA?
- A. RECA applies to certain residents of Nevada, Utah and Arizona who lived downwind from the Government's above-ground nuclear tests, underground uranium miners, and persons who participated onsite in an atmospheric detonation of a nuclear device and contracted a specified disease.
- Q. How much will these changes cost in terms of benefits?
- A. We estimate a total benefits cost of approximately \$769 million over 10 years.
- Q. How about the administrative costs?
- A. Based on workload projections, we estimate a cost of \$34 million over the 10-year period.
- Q. How much disability compensation would a veteran exposed to radiation be eligible to receive?
- A. Rates of compensation depend upon the degree of disability and follow a payment schedule applicable to all veterans. Disability ratings are in increments of 10%.
- Q. What other services, in addition to the disability compensation, does VA offer these veterans?
- A. Veterans are provided health care for their exposure-related illness without regard to age, service-connected status, or income level and no co-payments are required. In addition, VA maintains a registry program for veterans exposed to ionizing radiation, and veterans on the registry

are provided a complete physical examination. As of the beginning of 2000, nearly 22,000 veterans had received this special examination.

4. VA partnership could result in landmark health care service By Marilyn Werber Serafini, National Journal

The Veterans Affairs Department is expected to soon form a landmark partnership with the private sector that would set a new precedent for delivering health care to veterans. If VA Secretary Anthony J. Principi approves the project, which he is expected to do, veterans in Colorado would get their surgeries and other care alongside civilians in a sparkling new state-of-the-art hospital that the VA would build jointly with the University of Colorado Health Sciences Center. The department is viewing the collaboration with an eye toward other such joint ventures that would improve quality and reduce costs.

It's not as if Colorado's veterans dislike their autonomous health care network. Indeed, veterans have historically sought to maintain control over their unique care-delivery system. In 1992, Edward J. Derwinski, then VA Secretary, recommended opening several underused VA hospitals located in rural areas to poor civilians. Besieged by angry veterans, Derwinski eventually resigned.

But that was 10 years ago, before health care had become so expensive, and before the development of so much breakthrough--and costly--diagnostic and treatment equipment. It was also before many veterans hospitals started looking old and, some say, outdated.
