We are in contact with the Marshall Islanders to work with them getting their bill passed in Congress, more to come from the Marshall Islanders soon.

Some of our wives are busy setting up the 2017 Convention in Branson, MO for the middle of September, more on this next newsletter.

Atomic Veteran Legislative Corner --

On the Federal level HR632 in the House and S283 titled Mark Takai Atomic Veterans Healthcare Parity Act have 72 and 6 sponsors respectively. This legislation adds the Enewetak Atoll Radiological Cleanup Veterans to the list of Atomic Veterans included for Tittle 38 presumed diseases. Legislation for the Atomic Veteran Medal is expected to be introduced this session in both the House and Senate by the end of March. National Atomic Veterans Day continues, no Bill has been introduced nor do we have any expected introduction date. On the State Level Minnesota House and Senate introduced Bills to change Chapter 10 of the Statues to Include July 16th as Atomic Veterans Day. These Bills were referred to the respective VA committees. On March 9th the Senate Bill was voted on in committee and passed with unanimous support being referred to the Floor for a future vote. On March 10th the House Bill was voted on in committee and passed with unanimous support being referred to the Floor for a future vote. This is a major accomplishment.

REVISITING IONIZATION RADIATION EXPOSURE CLAIMS/BENEFIT STRATEGIES

Due to an error introduced during the publishing/printing process to the presumed diseases Table and a change in the prescription drug copay we are revising the December 2016 Newsletter article

If you have been involved with military service activities that could result in Ionization Radiation Exposure, regardless of whether you have a radiological induced disease, your first step should be to contact your VA (Veterans Administration) Environmental Health Care Coordinator (the directory can be found here: http://www.publichealth.va.gov/exposures/coordinators.asp) to schedule an Ionization Health Care exam (at no cost) and to be placed on the Ionization Radiation Registry. Remember there is strength in numbers, the larger the group the more likely they will receive attention. As with many VA programs, you may have to be persistent and insistent. In the past, the Registry has sent out a newsletter. Some of the things the registry can be used for is to find common ailments and the number of individuals exposed.

Step three: if you have additional radiological induced disease(s) contact your local VSO (Veteran Service Office) to make a Service connected claim. Presumed radiological diseases are listed in Table 1 VA 38 CFR 3.311(B)(2) (as of Dec 15, 2016). Other diseases can be claimed with proper documentation. Step four, not as well known, is the Military Exposure category. Before determination has been completed on the previous applications, ask to be assigned to Priority Group 6 as "Veterans exposed to Ionizing Radiation during atmospheric testing or during the occupation of Hiroshima and Nagasaki". Changes in the Prescription Copay rate, as of Feb. 27 2017, no longer provide a lower cost copay for non Ionization Radiation disease prescriptions. However, this is reduction in out of pocket costs. See Table 2.

"Military Exposure" prescriptions and medical care associated to the exposure should be covered 100% under "Other qualifying factors, including treatment related to their military service experience." Generic drugs, which are the most commonly prescribed, will have the lowest copay amount. The annual copay limit a veteran must pay will decrease to \$700 from the current \$960. Veterans who pay more than the annual copay limit will continue to receive their medications but will not have to pay anything for them. 


OPERATION ABLE & BAKER

My ship, the USS FLUSSER DD-368, was the first combat vessel to enter the harbor at Nagasaki after the atomic bomb had been dropped.

We led a Hospital Ship and Navy CVE into the harbor. they were there to rescue and treat POW's prior to taking them to other places for treatment, we were told they were taken to Manila and Tokyo.

When the USS Flusser finished their responsibility in Nagasaki we were sent up river to Sasebo to care for the slave labor and dependents. We were to see that they had proper care.

Soon after we were on our way to the United States. We were told not to discuss any of our experiences with anyone under penalty of imprisonment or worse.

When we arrived at San Pedro, California, we learned that we were to be a target vessel at Bikini for Operation Crossroads. We took part in Test Abel and Test Baker. Our ship was heavily contaminated with radiation from the explosions of Atomic Bombs.

The result of this exposure to me was prostrate cancer, one melonama, and many skin cancers. I also had many problems with my kidneys. The VA termed me 100% disabled and indicated that I was heavily exposed to radition.

My rank at the time was PHM 2nd Class and an independent duty specialist. I was later raised in rank to PhM 1st Class.

SOMETIMES YOU GET LUCKY

A much-repeated adage asserts that "an army travels on its stomach." Certainly, food is important, and in any discussion with military veterans there is a good chance that the subject will come up. It is also true that in the military caste system, the higher your rank the better you eat. Thus, on a typical navy ship, one moved down a line as various mass-produced items were deposited on a large metal tray which were then carried to a long table where he would sit on similarly long bench to eat; upon finishing, he would carry tray, cup and utensils to the appropriate area, rinse them off and stack them by the dishwasher. Chief petty officers fared a bit better. They still ate the same food, but in a smaller room, with more pleasant surroundings and, depending on the particular vessel, there were more individuality and more amenities.

But there was a real distinction between enlisted personnel and officers. Officers ate in the wardroom where, even on small ships, they had regular plates and silverware. They had cups and saucers instead of the mugs used by enlisted personnel. And, most importantly, their food was more attractive and was prepared and served by mess attendants. Finally, on the larger ships, senior officers had their own private mess (dining facility), even officers' cooks.

One important advantage of serving on a very small ship (crew smaller than 100) is the fact that officers on these vessels subsist on the general mess. As a consequence, although the wardroom mess has linen tablecloths and china plates, the food is the same, cooked by the same cooks in the same galley. Thus, because the officers are eating it, they have some influence regarding its quality.


In the spring of 1946 I was assigned to the USS ATR-40, a rescue tug, with a crew of 40 men and 5 officers. Shortly after I reported aboard, we were ordered to proceed to Bikini Atoll. There, we would be assigned to the salvage unit for OPERATION CROSSROADS, the first post-war series of atmospheric tests of nuclear weapons.

Shortly after we arrived at Bikini our leading ship's cook began spending most of his waking hours at the rear of the ship. Hour after hour, day after day, he would simply sit on one of the bitts, staring out over the lagoon. In time he was transferred for transportation back to Pearl Harbor and psychiatric observation. To this day there is at least a small question in my mind as to whether he was mentally disturbed or simply more clever than those of us who remained aboard, and who have spent decades dealing with radiation induced health problems.


Of course, our commanding officer requested a replacement cook and we hit the jackpot. The aircraft carrier, USS Saratoga was one of the target vessels and once she had been deployed in the target array her crew was removed and those men were available. As a consequence, we ended up with a man who had been an officer's cook on the Saratoga. Now, it has always been my contention that navy ships are provisioned with top quality raw materials, but the navy cooks frequently don't do it justice. This man, having cooked for some high-ranking officers, knew how to make the best of this material. We ate well that summer!

The Saratoga, of course, survived the air drop on July 1. But the underwater detonation on July 25 seriously damaged her hull. She lasted through the night, but on the following afternoon she began to go down. Ships in the area lay dead in the water and watched as this victor of many WW II battles slid quietly into the deep. The ATR-40 was less than 200 yards away and I was able to see R.C., our cook, at the rail watching his former ship disappear.
