# NAAU AMBASSADOR TO BRITAIN turns 90!

Alex Partezana, a NAAV member, celebrates his 90th birthday October 2nd.

In 1951 he received a letter in the mail. That year the government picked over 400,000 men to be drafted into the military and he was one of them.

In April 1953 he was stationed at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. The 8th Marines, 2nd battalion was based there. From there 2800 marines were ordered to Yucca Flats, Nevada to take part in the atomic bomb testing. They were transported in military planes called 'flying box cars'. The plane was called a Flying Boxcar because the inside of the plane had no seats. There were benches along both walls and one in the center from the pilots to the rear. That way they could transport a lot more troops. They all reported to a camp called Desert Rock V.

The operation he was involved with was known as UPSHOT KNOT HOLE. There were eleven atomic bomb tests in this series each called a 'shot'. His shot was called BADGER.

They reported to a tent camp with squad type tents, each held ten marines. The next day they went to a class with instructors and a film. They showed what to expect when the blast occurred. After class they were given liberty from ten AM to 12 midnight in Las Vegas.

At that time Las Vegas was a very small town. If you've ever been to Las Vegas or seen it on TV, most of the fancy lights and casinos you see are in a part of Vegas called the strip. At that time the strip was mostly in the planning stage and the casinos were in the downtown area.

The next morning they loaded into a truck that took them to Yucca Flats some 42 miles away. They all walked to a tower which was 300 feet tall and had a bomb mounted on top. You couldn't see it since it was covered with a tarpaulin. At the base of the tower they placed all different types of equipment. There were tanks, jeeps, cannons, rifles, and pistols. Some of the jeeps and tanks had mannequins dressed in combat gear sitting in them. In other places they had many crates containing c-rations. There was a gasoline supply dump, flame throwers, landing vehicles, and trucks.

They also used live sheep, pigs and rabbits during the test. To measure radiation they used something called a film badge. When you take a picture using film, the picture comes from the film reacting to light. Film also reacts to radiation in much the same way. They can develop the film and figure out how much radiation there was.

Pigs were placed in pens at various distances with film badges on them. The sheep were tied to cactus with film badges around their neck.

The Army engineers moved around cactus and juniper trees, to put them at various distances from the bomb.

The size of the Badger bomb was 23 kilotons which for an atomic bomb is pretty small. That 'pretty small' bomb was the equivalent of 23 thousand tons of TNT high explosive.

Their trench was a mile and a half from the bomb. We had volunteers that were in trenches one mile away and another group that was in trenches three quarters of a mile away. The men were a little nervous since behind our trench, farther away then they were from the bomb, were large pine trees and different size buildings to see the effect the bomb would have.

The men were taken back to the camp, and told to be ready to load up the trucks at 1 AM. The men arrived at the site at 3 AM and the bomb was set to go off at 4:30 in the morning. They were broadcasting instructions over a loud speaker. There were some lights to allow the men to get where they needed to go. The men were directed to there trenches, which were five feet deep and four feet wide. The night was very cold. Once the men were in there trenches they turned off the lights. It was so black you couldn't see your hand in front of your face. As the count down got down to five they were told to crouch down and lean against the wall towards the bomb and to keep our eyes open.

Even a mile and a half away from the explosion we would feel a blast wave like a [strong/brisk/?] wind. The men were to wait for the blast to go over the trench and then a few seconds later it would come back. Then the men were to stand up in the trench and look at the bomb.



First you would hear two distinct clicks then the blast. It got so bright that you were blinded for a second. The ground shook so violently that the trench looked like it whipped when you looked down the trench. When they stood up there was a big mushroom cloud and a big angry looking ball of fire rolling inside the clouds rising upward.

The men were ordered out of the trench and told to walk towards the bomb. Each squad leader had a geiger counter to register the radiation and he checked each member of his squad. When they were about a hundred yards away the radiation was too high and they were told to stop and go back to the trenches. After two hours they started walking back towards the blast area.

As they moved closer some of the men came across the animals. Most of them were hurt, the closer to the blast all of them were burned to some extent.

Upon getting to the spot where the tower had stood there was nothing left but a large depression. Most of the equipment at the base of the tower were either burned beyond recognition or was on fire. All the big equipment was thrown at various distances. Some were disintegrated. The animals close by were dead.




The men went back to camp and discarded all their clothes, to be burned. After that they showered in some temporary showers they had set up for the occasion.

They were told the exercise was top secret, under no circumstances were they to talk to anyone about what they were doing or why they were there. Alex tried mailing a letter to his wife, but because it was a souvenir envelope with a Yucca Flats logo on it came back marked "Can not be mailed" since it would have let her know where he was. He still has the envelope.

While they weren't allowed to talk about it, the papers had the whole story. The next day they published pictures of the twelve marines from the Cleveland area who had participated. They had pictures of the bomb and the men in the trenches.





# **UP-872 AND THE PROJECT DOMINIC ATOMIC BOMB TESTS**



In 1962 the United States was in the midst of the Cold War. We experienced The Cuban crisis and the Berlin crisis. I was living in Santa Clara California and was attending monthly Naval Reserve meetings at the Naval Air Štation Álameda. I was one of the many Weekend Warriors that train one weekend a month.

In August of 1961 I received a letter from President Kennedy recalling me to active duty in my Naval Air squadron, VP-872. I moved my family back to Tennessee and moved into my barracks at NAS Alameda. Our squadron was augmented by members of VP-701, VP-703, and VP-875 and other Naval Reservists. Our squadron flew patrols along the West coast and trained for our deployment to the South Pacific and Christmas Island in March of 1962. I was rated Aviation Electronics Technician 2nd class. (AT-2) and flew radioman position in crew 12. Each aircraft had a crew of 12 officers and enlisted.

We arrived on Christmas Island in March of 1962 and then came under operational command of Joint Task Force 8, participating in Project Dominic. Our squadron assignment was to fly patrols with our 12 P2V-5F Neptune aircraft and flight crews before each of the Atomic Bomb tests near Christmas Island. As I understand it, the main purpose of patrols was to ensure that there were no ships anywhere in the fallout area of the bomb tests. We searched thousand of square miles of the South Pacific with our radar the night before each early morning's bomb test. These tests occurred about twice a week.

We did locate a few freighters that did not get the maritime warnings. We were able to notify them to change course and get clear of the test area. The scheduled bomb test would have to be aborted if we were unable to contact the ship. The international distress frequency worked more than once to establish contact with the freighter. The Russian spy ships stayed just outside the test area perimeter. As crew 12 radioman I kept a list of possible frequencies that might work.

After completing our night patrol we landed and mustered on the flight line near our aircraft. It turns out that every soul on Christmas Island had to be accounted for and positioned near an aircraft or ship in order to evacuate the island in case of a problem with the bomb's detonation. The bombs were dropped from a B52 over a floating barge target and were set to detonate at several thousand feet above the ocean. If the bomb failed to detonate and exploded in the ocean the island could be sprayed by radioactive water. Fortunately this never happened. We were prepared to load about 25 persons in our aircraft which normally carries a crew of 12.

Our squadron was also briefly called upon to fly some patrols out of Johnston Island for some bomb tests that were made using land launched rockets with Atomic bomb warheads.

As you can imagine there was not a lot to do when off duty on Christmas Island. We spent a good deal of time lounging under the Cabana trees near our barracks. Our movie theater was outside and prone to heavy tropical rains during our movies. We had two small communities we could visit. One was named London and the other Paris. We were not allowed to hang out with the local Christmas Island residents. We did get to visit the end of the island where the British performed their atomic bomb test in the 1950's. They left a lot of their rusted out equipment and scrap in a nearby junk yard. I found

out that the dump was recently all cleaned up and shipped to the scrap yard. VP-872 flew close 1,900 hours in April and May of 1962. VP-872 was deactivated in August 1962 in ceremonies

presided over by ADM. Chester W. Nimitz. VP-872 has flown over 4,900 hours or more than 750,000 miles and has maintained a perfect safety record.

I have been coordinating our VP-872 squadron reunion for a number of years and collected many photos and artifacts. They are stored at the Alameda Naval Air Museum in Alameda California.

Our shipmates have related many interesting tales about their experiences on Christmas Island now called Kiritimati. Our squadron was comprised of close to 300 shipmates when recalled. We are now down to about 30 shipmates. Several of our shipmates became ill and were able to file a claim with the Radiation Exposure Compensation Act. (RECA) and receive compensation.

# UNITED WE STAND

In March of this year I had the extreme pleasure of receiving a recognition award at a meeting which included both the Atomic Cleanup Veterans and the Marshall Islanders. This award means a lot to me because it recognizes a principle which I have long felt is important; that principle is enshrined in the frequently quoted line, "United we stand, divided we fall". Let me tell you why this is important for me.

I am a survivor of Operation Crossroads. I suffered health problems as a result of that experience. I also had a daughter who died of illness that I firmly believe was related to my radiation exposure. And I have a son who suffers from Addison's disease, which is a problem related to the endocrine system. The government's assertion that radiation induced ailments can't be genetically transmitted is contrary to the opinion of all the geneticists. And, for over three decades, almost every physician I consulted would rather obviously avoid the subject.

Then, in 1980, I read an article about the National Association of Atomic Veterans in my local newspaper. The organization (referred to as NAAV) had been established by another atomic bomb test survivor, Orville Kelly and his wife, Wanda, in 1979. Orville had died a few months later, but the organization survived with Wanda at the helm. I sent an inquiry immediately to the cited address in Burlington, Iowa. Quickly I was invited by Wanda Kelly to join NAAV, and before long I and two other navy veterans were appearing around Wisconsin, spreading the word.

The membership of NAAV was, of course, primarily veterans. However, not long after this, another organization, the National Association of Radiation Survivors was founded by Dorothy Lagaretta, a laboratory worker connected with the Manhattan Project at the University of California. NARS was an organization of people who had been exposed to radiation related to the Atomic Bomb. included nuclear industry workers, radium miners, and people who lived downwind of nuclear tests: this very soon came to include Marshall Islanders. By 1984 NAAV membership was approaching a thousand; at what was its fifth annual meeting. which was held in Kissimmee, Florida that fall, Wanda an-nounced that she was officially stepping down as Executive Director; she said she needed

more time to organize the other aspects of her life, but would still continue as a permanent member of the Board of Directors.

After almost four decades, a few of the details escape me, but my memory tells me that the person who took over leadership of the organization at that time was a fairly high ranking reserve, or National Guard officer; the headquarters also moved to Eldon, Missouri. It is also my recollection that this person brought with him a number of new members. I do know that, at the general meeting, I made a motion to the effect that we, of all people, should take a stand supporting universal nuclear disarmament and was shouted down. In response to this, several of us pretty much withdrew from participation in NAAV activities and joined NARS; NARS, in turn, took a much greater interest in veterans concerns.

Sometime in the 1990's, I ran into one of the members who had stayed active in NAAV. He told me that Oscar Rosen was now the commander, and that he had pretty much improved the situation. He told me that he really felt I should come back and help get back where they should be. I accepted his suggestion; now I would be active in both organizations.

Several years later, I had become president of NARS, and Richard Conant had succeeded Oscar at the head of NAAV. Coincidentally, on one particular occasion, both organizations had planned their annual meetings for overlapping dates at neighboring hotels in Las Vegas. Today, more than ever, the mere existence of nuclear weapons endangers life as we know it. For that very reason, I was pleased to participate in a meeting which brought together Atomic Veterans, Cleanup Veterans and Marshallese people for a common cause. The limitation, and, hopefully, elimination of nuclear weapons is a topic that affects the whole world. In my opinion we should therefore be reaching out for everyone to join in the effort.
